

Family Outcomes Data for Children Served in Early Intervention National and State Results, FFY 2010

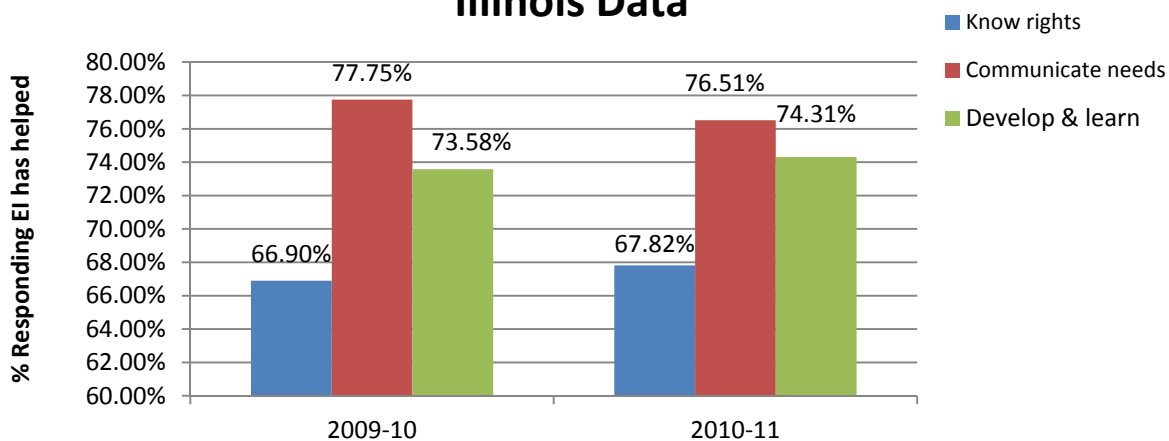


As part of their annual performance report for Part C services, states are required to report the percent of families participating in Part C who report that early intervention services have **helped the family help their children develop and learn, effectively communicate their children's needs, and know their rights**. For FFY 2010, all states used surveys to gather the data for reporting on this indicator.

National average performance of families reporting that Early Intervention services helped their family:

A. Know their rights	86%
B. Effectively communicate their children's needs	87%
C. Help their children develop and learn	90%

Change from Last Year (FFY 2009 to FFY 2010)

Each state examines their results from one year to the next. When looking at the results in this way, states may demonstrate progress (more families respond positively), remain stable (approximately the same number of families respond positively), or demonstrate slippage (fewer families respond positively). States are asked to determine improvement activities to enhance their results each year.

EI has helped the family know their rights:

- States making progress: 29 states (53%)
- States remaining stable: 14 states (25%)
- States with slippage: 12 states (22%)

EI has helped the family help the child develop and learn:

- States making progress: 24 states (44%)
- States remaining stable: 17 states (31%)
- States with slippage: 14 states (25%)

EI has helped the family effectively communicate their children's needs:

- States making progress: 24 states (44%)
- States remaining stable: 14 states (25%)
- States with slippage: 17 states (31%)
