EITP Updates

The EI Training Program (EITP) at the University of Illinois has been working on a number of transitions this fiscal year. The most recent transition involves a change in the learning management system that is used to deliver online trainings sponsored by the EITP. The new system is called Moodle and it will require all online training participants to have a Moodle account.

There have been a number of News postings developed and distributed by the EITP to help with this transition over the last several weeks, all of which can be found on the EITP website under the <u>News</u> postings linked to the home page. In addition, an <u>Online Training FAQ</u> page includes a number of updates to support online learners through this transition and as they navigate online trainings in the new Moodle system.

Preparing Culturally Responsive Early Intervention and Early Childhood Special Education Personnel

The Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) program in the Department of Special Education at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has been awarded a federal grant (PCRP Project) to fund students interested in earning a **master's** an emphasis on working with young children, ages bith to six, with disabilities and their families. The focus of this master's

degree, with an emphasis on working with young children, ages birth to six, with disabilities and their families. The focus of this master's degree program is to prepare personnel who have expertise in young children's social-emotional development as a foundation for providing culturally responsive and evidence-based services. This is a 2-year full-time master's program on the Champaign-Urbana campus. If accepted into the program, funding consists of a traineeship stipend, a tuition waiver, and waiver of some fees. Funding is limited and awarded on a competitive basis. Attached to this funding is a **service obligation** to be fulfilled after completion of the degree: two years of service in a professional setting that benefits young children with disabilities for every one-year of funding accepted. This service obligation can be met through employment in the ECSE field anywhere in the continental United States.

"This guide describes 10 practices that early childhood educators can use to support the development of language and communication skills of infants and toddlers. Because research supports the importance of adult-child interactions for infants and toddlers, the practices are designed to be done one-on-one or in small groups. Each practice draws upon the types of interactions that research suggests promotes language and communication skills. Each practice is presented with a description of the practice, research evidence that supports the use of the practice, and examples of how educators may use the practice with infants and toddlers. Although each practice is presented separately, many of the practices can be used in combination with each other."

Backpack Connection handouts can be sent home when a new strategy or skill is introduced in the classroom to inform parents about what their child is learning at school and to provide specific ideas on how to use the strategy or skill at home."



The Youngest Americans: A statistical Portrait of Infants and Toddlers in the United States

Click on the image for a report that "provides a comprehensive indicators-based portrait of the 12 million infants and toddlers in America. It includes basic demographical data on these young children, including information about their health and well-being, and the well-being of their parents. Some key findings show that: many infants and toddlers in America today are starting out with severe economic hardship; there are considerable inequities marked by income and race/ethnicity and these inequities are often compounded by fragile family situations; the majority of mothers of infants and toddlers are working; parental leave, high-quality child care, and access to early intervention services are out of reach for many families raising infants and toddlers."
